LIVING WITH DIABETES

I am the Youth Chairperson for Youth with Diabetes (YWD) and I have experience as a volunteer Camp Leader for more than six years. Dubai is on my travel list because I went to present a research paper at the International Diabetes Federation (IDF) Congress in December 2011. The paper was on programmes that YWD has implemented to help teens living with diabetes improve their HbA_{1c} by becoming a Youth Leader.

The local towns I listed are the places where YWD has held camps this year. Still to be added to that list for this year will be Cape Town, Kimberly, Port Elizabeth and Johannesburg again.


